Children's Town Malambanyama

Children's Town was established in 1990 providing skill training and rehabilitation of former street children. The project also started a community school for vulnerable children from the neighboring villages.

The objective of the Children's Town is to move children away from the streets and provide them with skills to enable them to take up healthy and productive lives.

In 2018, Children's Town provided basic education from preschool level to Grade 9, with Practical Theoretical Basic Education (PTG) for Grade 7 to 9, in which it integrated 90 former street children. The total is 437 children from preschool to grade 9. The project further trains 30 youth from the surrounding community in vocational skills.

HOPE Youth HIV Prevention

Hope Youth HIV prevention project started in July, 2018. It aims at mobilizing people to take action with the goal of reducing new HIV infections and avert AIDS and TB related deaths.

The project works with 12 sub-recipients, Support Groups for People Living with HIV, In and Out of School Youth Clubs, Community Health Workers and traditional leaders. The prevention activities are implemented in 12 districts in Central and Copperbelt Provinces.

The project additionally supports rolling out of community Anti-Retroviral Treatment (ART) distribution in 7 districts in North-Western Province. In 2018, the project mainly focused on startup activities, which included introducing the project in the 12 districts, mapping of all operational areas, orientation and contracting the sub recipient organizations, and training of various community volunteers. When fully operational, the project works with 60 health facilities, 60 schools and 60 Out of School Youth Clubs.
